

#### WHAT ARE AA'S 12 TRADITIONS AND WHY SHOULD I CARE?

Whenever anyone mentions the 12 Traditions, someone or several someones inevitably groan. Many members of Alcoholics Anonymous consider the study of the Traditions uninteresting and boring. After all, they aren't going to keep us sober, and 12<sup>th</sup> step work is much more important. Right?

Wrong. While the 12 Steps are what keep us sober, the 12 Traditions are what keep Alcoholics Anonymous itself healthy and active.

Think about it. There are a LOT of things that need to be done before 12<sup>th</sup> step work is possible. Books must be printed and purchased. Meetings must be set up, chaired, and advertised. Hotlines must be set up and answered. There is a lot to this thing called Alcoholics Anonymous other than one alcoholic working with another.

So, who does all this? Well, we do. And if you think about it, that is a miracle in itself. We are a bunch of selfish, self-centered alcoholics doing work that, on the surface, appears to be pretty selfless. How do we get all this done without our huge egos getting in the way?

That is what the 12 Traditions are for. Just as the 12 Steps are our guide for living, the 12 Traditions are our guide for keeping AA from falling apart under the chaos that we alcoholics are so good at creating. And just as we should keep our steps in mind as we go about our individual lives, we should also keep the traditions in mind as we go about our many service duties in AA. It has been said by some that the 12 Traditions protect us from ourselves.

Over the next several months, we will submit a series of essays in which we will discuss the 12 Traditions and try to make them clearer for those who are struggling to understand them. We hope you will find that they are not overly complicated. They are not only applicable in our service work but they are also applicable in our personal lives. At least we have found them so.
